Common Causes of SPD Tripping

- **End-of-Life of the SPD:** Metal Oxide Varistor (MOV)-based SPDs degrade over time as they absorb surges. Repeated surges, even below the rated nominal discharge current, increase leakage current, causing the SPD to self-activate its thermal disconnecter and disconnect from the circuit, which appears as a trip or fault indicator .
- **Short-Circuit or Internal Failure:** If the SPD fails in a short-circuit mode, it can immediately trip the upstream breaker. This is less common but critical to identify, as the SPD will no longer protect downstream equipment .
- **Excessive or Frequent Surges:** Lightning strikes, utility switching, or heavy inductive load switching can generate transient overvoltages that exceed the SPD's capacity, accelerating wear and triggering the trip mechanism .
- **Incorrect Installation or Wiring:** SPDs must be installed as close as possible to the power supply entry point, with short, low-inductance earth connections. Long or undersized grounding wires increase residual voltage and can reduce protection effectiveness, potentially causing the SPD to trip .
